#### Not just laptops

By now I'm sure everyone has heard about exploding laptop batteries. But I want you to know that it's not just limited to laptops. Amateur radio batteries have the same problem, apparently. I just bought a new battery for my radio. Been using it about a week or so.

Yes, I am an amateur radio operator. I have a handheld radio that I use every day. I check in with my dad every morning on the way to work.

So, today I'm driving to work, doing about 70mph in the fast lane. I smell something kind of like what you smell the first time you start up your furnace for the winter. Now, I have the defroster running, but it's been going for a half hour or more, so that's not it. And it doesn't smell like someone's fireplace. Hmmm, maybe there's a grass fire nearby? ..... BANG!!! Something really loud just happened and my right leg hurts. I look to my right, and see that my handheld radio is on fire! OK, no shoulder on the left, on go the emergency flashers and I cut across 3 lanes of traffic and way over onto the right shoul-

Now, the radio is burning pretty good. I need to get it out of here. I open the door

and try to throw it out. And that's when I realize that it is tethered to my truck by the antenna cable. This is by far the scariest part of the whole event. I somehow manage to disconnect the antenna without catching either myself or the truck on fire. I don't really want to throw the radio, so I set it on the running board. At this point the battery has melted enough that it disengages from the radio on its own, and falls to the ground, spitting and sizzling.

I wait until the battery calms down a bit, and toss it into the bed of my pickup truck. Now, there are a couple of reasons why it's really lucky that I was driving the pickup and not the 4Runner this morning. First of all, instead of lying on the seat like it would have been in the 4Runner, the radio was sitting in one of the cup holders in the center console. So the initial explosion was pretty much contained within the cup holder (although there's soot, small pieces of plastic, and pieces of some kind of smallgauge wire mesh everywhere). Secondly, I was able to toss the thing into the bed of the truck, instead of putting it in the cargo area of the 4Runner. Because, about a minute after I tossed it into the truck bed, the thing exploded again.

Up until this point, the battery pack was pretty much still in one piece, and roughly its original size and shape. With this second explosion, half the battery cells were forcibly ejected from the pack, and wound up just behind the pickup cab, strung out in a row like some futuristic hitech sausages. The remainder of the battery pack, seriously twisted out of shape, wound up almost at the tailgate.

So, the good things about this morning's events were: I was driving the fully insured pickup, not the 4Runner without comprehensive coverage. The initial explosion occurred inside the cup holder, not on the upholstery. I didn't crash the truck when this thing exploded and scared the stuffing out of me. I threw the battery into the pickup bed, instead of into the cargo area of the 4Runner. The secondary explosion did not occur while I was holding the battery in my hand. And, I had a really cool "show and tell" item at work today.

Oh, and surprisingly enough, the radio still works.


