## How to Pass the General Class Exam

Want to upgrade to level II of the Amateur licensing program? Here are some hints, designed primarily to help you pass the FCC General Class exam. Upgrading from the Novice or Technician class to General has significant advantages. You may now operate on specific segments of the 80m, 40m, 20m, and 15m bands, the most popular bands for long distance communication, not previously available.

That's not all, however. The General class also allows operation on 160 meters, 60 meters, 30 meters, 17 meters and 12 meters, along with the identical privileges granted to Advanced and Extra licensees. Upgrading to General, therefore, amounts not only to an achievement, but a giant step forward to enjoying the many facets of Ham radio.

The new General Class pool, effective July 2007, has been significantly revised, and contains questions on topics, like NVIS antennas, 60 meters and logic design. Be prepared to know the difference between NAND gate and A NOR gate!

And yes, there are questions on Morse code, protocols, Q signals etc., even though the code requirement has been eliminated. There is still plenty of action in the CW portion of the Ham bands, and you may even hear the Q signal, **QRQ**, but I rather doubt it! (It means "Send Faster!") and it is one of the questions on the exam(see **G2F10**)

Passing the General exam opens up a lot of new frequencies, i.e., frequencies not previously available to Tech of Novice licensees. There are specific segments in the 40m, 20m, 15m, and the 80m bands where Generals are allowed and you will also have the same frequency privileges that Advanced or Extra operators enjoy on 160m, 50m, 30m, 17m, 12m, and 10m. That is a huge amount of bandwidth!

It is important, therefore, to know the precise frequencies for Generals in the so-called "Action bands", 40, 20, 15, and 80 meters. Studies these carefully! Watch out for questions on the 60m band, there are a few distinct differences(for example you can only use USB on 60 meters-that's not true for any other band!) Note also that the 30m band is restricted to CW and that's not true for any other band either!
