Peter, KA1AXY John, WA1IGL - SK by Marc, WA1R

If there ever was an "Elmer's Elmer," it was John MacLeod, WA1IGL. In the 1960s and 70s, Mac was responsible for bringing more new hams into the hobby than anyone I can remember in this area.

I first met him 20 years ago when I was studying for my Novice ticket. The ARRL referred me to a "certified instructor" and the friendly voice — when I finally made the call — at the other end of the line was none other than WA1 (Independent Girl Lover).

Mac was involved in a project with the phone company at the time, but, he still took the time to introduce me to another local ham -- a guy with the call K1AZE and another radio hobbyist, Jim Boates, WA1IGL. The rest, as they say, is history. I set up an appointment with Jim for my Novice test and, after lots of sweating, I did pass (on the first time, too).

Mac never left the picture, though, because like all new hams, he considered us his "kids." He took the time to help us with just about any question we had, no matter how silly or dumb it may have seemed. To Mac, no question was unimportant.

He was just that committed to the hobby and the Framingham Amateur Radio Assn.

A past president — in the 1960s — Mac led the club through some lean times. Still, he never lost his enthusiasm. Whenever there was an event that needed coverage, Mac was there with his trusty handheld and mobile station. (He told a story of carrying an ancient two-meter HT that was so heavy that well it ... needless to say there was a lot of belt-cinching that day to keep the trousers in place).

He was an active participant in many Field Days, going to the point of securing the Dog Pound on Badger Road during the early 1980s for Field Day. He also drove a riding mower to make sure it was mowed.

Field Days setup dawned with Mac's truck hauling tower sections and whathaveyou to the site. That truck was a familiar site at FARA events as it not only

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hauled tower sections, but also served as Net Control station for many public service events, as well as one of the trucks that was used to haul tables to the Flea Market when we had to go elsewhere to get them.

Such was his dedication to the club that when it came time to buy a new vehicle about 15 years ago, he made sure it would be a pickup that would be available to FARA.

One of Mac's passions was Public Service operations. He was my predecessor as Radio Officer for the Town of Framingham's Civil Defense Department and helped to draw up the original radio plan for the town in the early 1970s. He was later active with the town's emergency preparedness council and took the Radiological Officer training course. He was one of the few certified Radiological Monitoring officers in the state. He also actively participated in Pad Cross exponered training.

And, he was one of the first Amateurs to work
on the annual Walk America Walkathon for the
March of Dimes. That was when it was 20-miler
in 1980.
That Mac was dedicated to FARA was easy to

That Mac was dedicated to FARA was easy to see. Not only did he open his house to newcomers, but, he also held classes for established operators. He also opened his house in the early 1980s to host the FARA picnic.

Mac's interests in Amateur Radio were widely varied. Not only did he support FARA in any way he could, including becoming one of the first Volunteer Examiners for the club in the mid-1980s (we actually held the first VE test in his basement), but, he also supported other community-based organizations, including the Masons, York and Scottish Rites of Masonry.

In addition to all this, Mac headed up a sixmeter net, a 15-meter net and a CW net during the 1980s. Indeed he was active. Mac took an early out from the phone company

Mac took an early out from the phone company about 11 years ago, but, he never lost his interest and love of Amateur Radio. Until he moved to Florida, he was active with either FARA or the Shriner's Radio Club.

I could go on, but, I think you can see that the Amateur Radio world lost a one of the great ones with Mac's passing. He will be missed by all who knew him.

I can only think that given his penchant for CW that instead of becoming the traditional Siller Key, he will still be sending loud and clear somewhere else. It's just that he'll be talking with his friend WATUEH (SK) or maybe Pinky Pinkham...who knows.

In this case, you would look for the antennas and turkey farm on your right.

Work will start after lunch on Friday. Helpers are welcome (and needed). If you want to help, someone will be on 147.15 or at the shack to tell you what's needed


