Although the ends were damaged by water, we still managed to get two lengths of over 120 feet and one of 70 feet. I absolutely despise installing PL259s, but in spite of this mild dislike for the task, I have developed a system for putting them on that seems to work well, and does not require the use of a high power soldering iron. The secret is to tin the braid well before attempting to install the connector. That, and remembering to slide that barrel nut on before soldering the connector!

"Radio Rage" Hazardous To Ham Radio ARRL

Entering his third year spearheading the FCC's Amateur Radio enforcement effort, Special Counsel for Amateur Radio Enforcement Riley Hollingsworth says "radio rage" could become a bigger danger to the future of Amateur Radio than rule breaking.

"It's the infighting and arguments and juvenile spats," Hollingsworth said this week. "That's going to come back to haunt us if we don't just grow up. It will do the service in, if the ham community doesn't put a stop to it."

Hollingsworth said that he's encouraged

that the FCC's enforcement program has the support of "99.9%" of the amateur community and that the vast majority of hams follow the rules. But, he said that radio rage in the form of such things as on-air squabbles or frequency fights can degrade the bands just as quickly as outright rule breaking. "The FCC can't do anything about that," he said. "It's up to the amateur community."

Hollingsworth said that while much radio rage technically is not illegal, it reflects poorly on Amateur Radio and can balloon into an enforcement issue. More important, he said, rude or intemperate on-air behavior might provide just the sort of ammunition that an entity seeking additional spectrum will use against Amateur Radio.

Hollingsworth predicted that the departure January 19 of FCC Chairman William Kennard and the changing of the guard the White House the next day will not alter the course of the current amateur enforcement effort. He said he sees nothing but positive changes ahead. "I'm willing to bet my SX-115 that we won't miss a beat," he said, referring to one of his latest acquisitions of vintage ham gear, "as long as the amateur community lets it be known it still wants enforcement."

Hollingsworth said it was pressure from the ARRL and individual amateurs that prompted the resumption of amateur enforcement in 1998 during Kennard's tenure, "and it's the type of program that needs that continual pressure to keep it going," he added. Overall complaints are down, Hollingsworth said, "but no one can be complacent."

The Kingdom of Bhutan is the subject of this month's QSL and the feature of this month's FARA meeting. The A52A dxpedition gave many Hams a new one including yours truly. The signals from A52A were very weak on my wire antenna so I was very lucky to work this dxpedition on 15 meter SSB, number 291 on my DXCC list. Prior to this dxpedition, very few Hams had worked Bhutan since amateur radio operation was, with few exceptions, not permitted. Though the dxpedition was limited to 100 watts, they were still able to make over 82,000 QSO's with Hams around the world.

The back of the card has nice description of Bhutan:

Hidden deep within the great Himalayan mountains, Bhutan developed its own civilization over the past almost 2000 years. The population of 600,000 lives in close harmony with nature. It is a matter of great pride to the Bhutanese that their small kingdom was never colonized. This mythical land is one of the last hidden domains of man, now cautiously coming out of centuries of isolation. The wind roaring down the majestic valleys of the Himalayas produces the sound of the mythical Thunder Dragon, for which the Kingdom is named.

King Jigmi Singye Wangchuck became the youngest modern monarch is 1972. He has steered his kingdom through almost 30 years of development into the 21st Century, with emphasis on preserving the rich religious and

cultural heritage. Bhutan's population is, in many ways, one large family. More than 90% of the people live on subsistence farming. The Bhutanese are physically strong and fiercely independent with an open and ready sense of humor. Hospitality is a built-in social value in Bhutan.

FARA thanks Dave, K1HT, for supplying the 60 minute tape of the Bhutan dxpedition to be shown at this month's meeting. Hope to see you there.

FARA - The Early Years Transcribed by Karen Hess

November 10, 1933

The 14th regular meeting of the C.A.R.A. was called to order at 8:20 p.m. by Vice President J. D. McLean. No business being before the meeting the speaker Mr. Joe Mullen was introduced. Mr. Mullen formerly with station WNAC showed some interesting slides of their installation at Squantum and covered in detail the way in which programs were handled thru the Colombia Network.

After the speaker had completed his talk the meeting was opened for questions.

It was suggested by the Secty. that the club go thru WBR at the next regular meeting. The majority present were in favor.

Motion for adjournment by Mr. Rowland. Seconded. So voted. November 24, 1933

November 24, 1955

The 15th regular meeting of the C.A.R.A. was called to order promptly at 8 p.m. by Vice Pres. J. D. McLean. The report of the Secty. was read and accepted.

Volunteers for code practice were asked for and about 8 members responded. It was agreed to meet with the Secty. on the following Wed. for a definite arrangement to conduct a code class between meetings.

No further business being before the meeting it was adjourned early and the members left to visit WBR at Millis thru special arrangement with Mr. Stanire.
