"I've got my license, Now what?"

This will be a series of articles designed for the "soon to be", or new novice. The sort of questions I'll attempt to deal with are: What kind of equipment should you get. What about the "low" bands; should I get on? How much is it going to cost to get on the air? If you have any questions you would like to see discussed here, give me a call (877-3340)

First, I'd like to deal with a few terms the beginner may find confusing. Along the way I'll go into some of the different things in ham radio you may want to get involved with. Take for example the terms, "low bands" and "high bands".

There are lots of ways to classify ham radio activities. We could look at phone vs CW, high power vs low power, DX (talking to distant stations) vs regchewing; I like to think of ham radio as falling into two categories of activities; LOW bands and HIGH bands.

"LOW bands" is ham radio slang referring to the ham bands falling between 2 and 30 megahertz. "HIGH bands" is a slang term referring to those bands from .30Mhz and higher.

Now get ready to be confused a bit.

The correct technical names for those frequencies between 2 and 30 MHz are MF (Medium Frequency) and HF (High Frequency). The technical names for those frequencies above 30MHz is the VHF (Very High Frequency), UHF (Ultra High Frequency), and SHF (Super High Frequency).

It can be confusing when the HF bands are referred to as "the LOW bands"; and VHF and above is referred to as "the HIGH bands.. This came about because the LOW bands, composed of the High Frequency bands, are lower in frequency than the HIGH bands, which include VHF and above. I am sure that the proceeding has thoroughly confused you. The chart at the bottom of the page may help.

I like the LOW and HIGH bands view of things because, more than being a difference in frequencies, the two bands have a different set of activities. The low bands offer much in the way of "traditional" ham activities and the high bands offer more in the way of avant garde activities as well the 2M band: ham radio's "party line". MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 1988 MEETING OF THE FRAMINGHAM AMATEUR RADIO ASSOCIATION, INC.

The September meeting of FARA convened at the Mass. Civil Defense Headquarters on Route 9 in Framingham.

Our activities officer, Marc Stern, N1BLH, introduced Royce Sawyer, N1BPU, Communication Officer for the State Department of Civil Defense, who described the operation of the Civil Defense headquarters.

The business meeting opened at 7:41 PM with Don Morse, KALMLM, presiding. The Treasurer's report and the Education Committee's report were presented and accepted by the membership. Feedback on the FARA picnic was solicited; it was revealed that Warren Center in Ashland was a very favorable site, but that there was insufficient advance notice given. It was moved by Eric Kushnick, WA2BWV, and seconded that the Sunday before Labor Day be reserved every year for the club picnic.

After some discussion, it was revealed that smoking at club meetings is not allowed per club bylaws.

Education Committee Chairman Ed Weiss, W1NXC, stated that registration for Amateur Radio classes would take place at the Framingham Public Library Main Branch on September 10 at 9:30 AM.

Lew Nyman, K1AZE, gave the date for the Fall FARA Flea Market and Amateur Exams as being on Sunday October 23, 1988 at the Framingham Civic League building on Concord Street; setup is to take place on Saturday October 22.

Dick Landau, W1IBN, is presently composing the FARA newsletter, and stated that help is needed, especially by those with continuing access to a computer/word processor.

Don Morse, KALMLM, is looking for ideas for future club topics for the entertainment segment of FARA meetings.

Several members expressed interest in a Sunday brunch to take place once each month.

Our Volunteer Examiner, Dick Marshall, W1KUG, gave information on the Amateur Exams to take place at the flea market site on October 23, and stated that no walk-in registration would be accepted after 11AM.

Wayne Ledder, W1EWL, discussed the need for 2-meter operators to assist in the 275th-Anniversary Medway Parade to take place on Saturday September 24th.

The Field Day report was given by Marc Stern, N1BLH: The club achieved approximately 310 phone and 155 CW contacts for a total score of slightly less than 2000 points.

Marc also mentioned the need for 2-meter operators at the Framingham 10K Walkathon on September 25th, and at the New Hampshire Fly-In at Manchester Airport on September 24 and 25. For anyone interested in helping with the fly-in, it was suggested that that person contact Bob Chin, W1FHT, or , N1FN.

A suggestion was made that someone check on the status of the ARRL publications donated to the Framingham Public Library by FARA in 1987, since it appeared that they are not currently in the library's collection.

A TV Guide article on hams on Slow-Scan TV between Channels 50 and 70 was mentioned.

A card of thanks for sympathy to the Bruce S. Garber family was presented.

It was moved by Don Morse, KALMLM, and passed, that the Framingham 10K Walkathon be sponsored in honor of juvenile diabetes.

The meeting adjourned at 9:39 PM for refreshments.
